
# NATIONAL HISTORIC REGISTRY DESIGNATION

Our beloved West Fairlee Center Church was officially entered on the National Register as a National Historic Site on June 21, 2002 according to Suzanne C. Jamele of the Vermont Division for Historic Presentation.

The Registry application process started in 1988 with a written assessment of the building prepared by Jack Anderson. It was completed by the thorough and rich investigative work of Bill Thrane, Architectural Historian in Thetford, VT. The community is deeply grateful to both of these men for their contribution to the church's protection

The architectural signifi-

cance of the church is that "it typifies many of the characteristics of the Greek Revival architectural style," and that "members of its early church community, such as Nathaniel Niles, played important roles in the formation of the state and nation" (from the National Register of Historic Places Registration Form). The church was founded in 1809 and the current building built in 1855 for a cost of \$2000. Early services were led by Nathaniel Niles (1740 - 1828) considered the founder of the Town of West Fairlee, and often held in his home known as Elmwood Farm currently owned by a Niles descendant Chuck Eaton and his wife Delcie Hoyt.
